The Law Enforcement Torch Run has been an instrumental fund raising campaign for Special Olympics Ontario and has had involvement with the Municipality of Chatham-Kent since 1989.

Each year, the Chatham-Kent Police Service has hosted a torch run fundraiser and an NHL Alumni Hockey Game where all proceeds are donated to Special Olympics Ontario.


Throughout the years, these fundraising campaigns have evolved, and a "Torch Ride" motorcycle fundraising event was introduced in 2011.

Annually the Chatham-Kent Police Service has been able to fundraise between \$7000.00 - \$10,000.00 through our fundraising efforts.

In 2018, The Chatham-Kent Police Service expanded their involvement with Special Olympics Ontario and introduced the "Polar Plunge" event, which in itself raised over \$14,000.00 for Special Olympics Ontario. This event with the addition of a charity carwash and test drive event brought the 2018 year end fundraising total in Chatham-Kent to \$30,000.00.

This increase allowed the opportunity for the Chatham-Kent Police Service to be named the "Highest Increase in Gross Revenue - 4th Place" - at the Law Enforcement Torch Run - Annual General Meeting and awards banquet in Sault Ste. Marie Michigan on Thursday January 31, 2019. Please see following page. Both Sergeant Michael Pearce and Acting Sergeant Jason Herder will be attending to represent our Service at this event.



Reference: Collection of Identifying Information in Certain Circumstances

Recommendations: Receive and approve the report for information purposes

Overview

In 2017 the Chatham-Kent Police Service incorporated policy and procedures surrounding the Collection of Identifying Information in Certain Circumstances as per Regulation 58/16 of the Police Services Act.

As part of this regulation the Chief of Police shall provide the Police Services Board an annual report. The annual report shall include statistical data related to the collection of identifying information. Below is the data related to the collection of identifying information for the Chatham-Kent Police Service, 2018.

Throughout 2018, officers with the Chatham-Kent Police Service did not interact with members of our community that would have initiated CIICC documentation. However, in medium to smaller communities such as Chatham-Kent, the general public would come to expect that their police service is well aware of the community they serve which includes the criminal sub-culture.

As such, members of the CKPS during 2018 conducted 2,915 person stops with known individuals. At no time during these interactions did officers gather new identifying information from the individual. These interactions are created to track the day to day activities of our officers, it also allows the service to pro-actively engage members of our community. Typically these interactions could be related to; community engagement, criminal investigation, traffic enforcement, intelligence lead policing, proactive policing, or simply observations.




