CHIEF'S COMMENDATION

To: Emergency Communications Operator (ECO) Helen Grubb, ECO Supervisor Jen Roesch, and Constables Marko Sapateiro, Kyle Blommers and Sergeant Fraser Leontowicz.

RE: Suicidal Person - CK24025829

On June 5, 2024 Chatham-Kent Police received a call from a frantic mother advising that her daughter had fled the residence stating she was going to kill herself. Due to previous history the family had significant concerns for their daughter's safety. The family went out looking for the daughter and came across her running into a large field that backs onto a local high school.

The call originated in the 911 Communication Center and has handled by Emergency Dispatcher Helen Grubb. ECO Grubb was able to gather all the necessary information and remained on the line with family until officers arrived. ECO Grubb played a pivotal role in gathering updates for the officers about the location as well as medical history from the family. It should also be noted that not only was ECO Grubb handling the call, but she was also the dispatcher for Fire that responded with an aerial truck for assistance. The Emergency Dispatcher Supervisor Jen Roesch was dispatching and provides immediate updates along with any support required. ECO Supervisor Roesch ensured that all information gathered was accurate and delivered all transmissions in a calming, organized sequence during a very intense incident.

Family observed the daughter starting to climb up a large pine tree and were trying to convince her to come down. Cst Marco Sapateiro, Cst Kyle Blommers and Sgt Fraser Leontowicz all arrived on scene. The officers located the female approximately 40 feet in the pine tree threatening to jump and kill herself. Negotiations commenced immediately to get the female down to safety, although she continued to state that she was going to jump. Sgt Leontowicz continued with negations in hopes of getting the female to remain calm. During negotiations, it was revealed that the female suffered from seizures and that they had become more frequent lately. As negotiations continued, it became apparent to Sgt Leontowicz that the female was in some type of medical distress as she suddenly became silent and non-responsive.

Cst Blommers and Cst Sapateiro immediately and without hesitation climbed the tree to protect the female from falling. As the officers started climbing the tree, Sgt Leontowicz observed that the female began shaking and convulsing which was clearly the symptoms of a seizure. The officers risked their own safety and lives by scaling the 40-foot tree as quick as possible to secure the female from falling. As Cst Blommers and Cst Sapateiro were securing the female, Sgt Leontowicz requested an aerial fire truck along with EMS to respond priority to rescue them and provide medical treatment.

The officers were able to secure the female against the tree as she continued to have at least two more seizures and was in clear medical distress. The female was unresponsive, and the officers did everything they could to provide medical treatment while ensuring the female's safety. The officers held and protected the female for approximately 20 minutes with little support until an aerial fire truck was able to assist. As the fire department was preparing to bring down the female, the officers had to manipulate a board in the tree as the female was still un-responsive. As the female was being lowered down, she came out of the seizure and became extremely combative while attempting to flee. Once safely down form the tree, the female was brought to the Chatham-Kent Health Alliance to be assessed.

DEPUTY CHIEF'S LETTER OF RECOGNITION

RE: Response and Action – Sudden Death – CK24030380

On Sunday, June 30, 2024 at 9:09 a.m., a 911 call was received indicating that a male party was not responsive with vital signs absent, inside a vehicle. The caller, a family member, was frantic while requesting emergency services attend her location in Wallaceburg immediately.

Less than three minutes later, Constable Taryn Apers arrived on scene and was met by the caller, along with a young child who was originally in the vehicle with the non-responsive person. Constable Apers located the non-response person inside the parked vehicle, hunched over with his head pinned between two seats. Constable Apers managed to immediately move the male into a semi-reclined position and started providing chest compressions.

Constable Andy Brown and Constable Chris Reynolds arrived shortly afterwards. All three officers were able to pull the heavyset male onto the ground and continue CPR. Unfortunately, despite all efforts, the male was succumbed to his condition and was pronounced.

In spite of the unfortunate outcome, these three officers displayed notable professionalism and tact in the face of a chaotic scene. The officers were quickly able to remove the male from the vehicle ensuring CPR attempts could be as effective as possible, while managing the scene with heartbroken and concerned family members in view. The three officers worked as a team, each dealing with an aspect of the investigation while rendering assistance as best they could. Their actions exemplified the character and reputation to which our Service strives for, and as a result, they are to be recognized for their action.



On Sunday June 11, 2024, Constables Joel Rehill, Hilary Pomajba, and Avery Wilson were working a paid duty at the Trot to the Beach 5km and half marathon. Near the end of the event, a volunteer hailed Constable Rehill and Constable Wilson because a runner had collapsed and became unresponsive. The officers attended and found Dr. Anthony Dixon was performing CPR on the unresponsive man. Dr. Dixon was in attendance at the event to watch a friend participate and immediately took action.

Dr. Dixon asked the officers to assist the man's family who were present. He performed CPR for about 12 minutes before CKFD arrived with an AED, which was administered. The man regained a pulse and Dr. Dixon monitored the man until EMS arrived. He joined paramedics in the ambulance for the trip to the Chatham-Kent Health Alliance and later rode in the ambulance to the Windsor Regional Hospital.

There is no doubt Dr. Dixon quick action and assistance saved this man's life, for which I am requesting he be recognized by the Chatham-Kent Police Services Board by way of a Board Citation.

If approved, the award will be presented to you on October 28, 2024 by Chatham-Kent Police Services Board Chair Mr. Patrick Weaver.

En tant que « Gardiens du Souvenir », la Légion royale canadienne s'efforce de perpétuer les sacrifices que nos soldats et leurs familles ont fait pour notre liberté. Le Livret de reconnaissance du service militaire sert comme un rappel pour les générations à venir, des contributions de nos anciens combattants à la création de notre nation et le maintien du Canada en tant que protecteur de la liberté.

Notre organisation est la plus grande organisation d'anciens combattants au Canada dédiée à les servir par le biais de la défense des droits, assistance d'urgence et assistance gratuite pour les demandes de pension. Nous ne sommes pas affiliés à aucun palier de gouvernement, et nous ne recevons de financement d'aucun palier de gouvernement. Les filiales comptent sur les cotisations des membres, les activités de collecte de fonds et les dons. En Ontario, nous avons plus de 390 filiales avec plus de 200 auxiliaires féminins composés de plus de 91 000 hommes et femmes. Ensemble, ils soutiennent leur communautés grâce à d'innombrables heures de travail bénévole pour soutenir le parrainage d'activités pour les jeunes telles que l'athlétisme, soccer, hockey, cadets, scouts et guides. Les filiales accordent plus de 815 000 \$ chaque année sous forme de subventions des fonds du coquelicot aux anciens militaires et aux militaires encore en service et/ou à leurs personnes à charge.

Avec le soutien de nos filiales et de nos auxiliaires féminins, notre direction débourse plus de 620 000 \$ chaque année par le biais de notre fondation caritative aux hôpitaux, aux foyers de soins de longue durée et aux services de pompiers volontaires pour l'équipement médical indispensable et plus de 200 000 \$ en bourses aux étudiants méritants.
